Anand, Inc., T/a Hubcap Inn, 6001 Belair Road – Class “BD7” Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – July 28, 2021** – On July 28, 2021 Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Cindy Tudhope, Inspector Rosalba Jordan, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson were under the age of 21; cadets were given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 9:20pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson ordered a single bottle of Bud Light beer from the server, later identified as Rajan Thapa, for a total of \$2.50, which they purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Inspector Tudhope and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Mr. Thapa, who did not have any identification on him; he did provide his name and date of birth to the task force, however. Inspector Tudhope and the task force informed Mr. Thapa that he had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Mr. Thapa was advised that he would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident.

Nitinkumar Patel and Matthew Wyman, Lavina, LLC T/a Six Pax “N” More, 6622 Belair Road – Class “A” Beer, Wine & Liquor License Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – July 28, 2021** – On July 28, 2021 Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Rosalba Jordan, Inspector Cindy Tudhope, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson were under the age of 21; cadets were given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 10:00pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson ordered a single 22oz. bottle of Heineken beer from the server, later identified as Ushabehen Patel, for a total of \$3.59, which they purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Inspector Jordan and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Ms. Patel, who produced an identification card verifying her identity. Inspector Jordan and the task

force informed Ms. Patel that she had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Ms. Patel was advised that she would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident.

Elma McDougal, Pari Sharma, and Sunil Sharma, Sai Baba Liquors, Inc., T/a Harford Road Liquors, 4627 Harford Road – Class “A” Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – July 28, 2021** – On July 28, 2021, Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Rosalba Jordan, Inspector Cindy Tudhope, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson were under the age of 21; cadets were given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 10:45pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson ordered a single bottle of Corona beer from the server, later identified as Sunil Sharma, for a total of \$2.23, which they purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Inspector Jordan and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Mr. Sharma, who produced a driver’s license verifying his identity. Inspector Jordan and the task force informed Mr. Sharma that he had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Mr. Sharma was advised that he would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident.

Thomas and Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson were under the age of 21; cadets were given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 9:00pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson ordered a single bottle of Pink Lemonade Smirnoff Vodka from the server, later identified as Rachhpal Singh Grewal for a total of \$13.07, which they purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. Moments later, Inspector Tudhope and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted Mr. Grewal and verified his identity via his Maryland driver’s license. Inspector Tudhope and the taskforce informed Mr. Grewal that he had just sold alcohol to underage police cadets. Inspector Tudhope returned the alcohol and the change to the establishment and recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Mr. Grewal was advised that he would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left the establishment without further incident.

Thomas Long and Mayur Sevalia, 7207 Harford Rd, Inc., T/a Mueller's Deli, 7205-07 Harford Road – Class "A" Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – July 28, 2021** – On July 28, 2021, Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Cindy Tudhope, Inspector Rosalba Jordan, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson were under the age of 21; cadets were given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 10:15pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson ordered a single bottle of Bud Light Lime beer from the server, later identified as Jasmita Ahswinkumar Mangukia, for a total of \$2.85, which they purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadets J. Thomas and Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage in a bag. Moments later, Inspector Tudhope and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Ms. Mangukia, who produced a Maryland driver's license verifying her identity. Inspector Tudhope and the task force informed Ms. Mangukia that she had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Ms. Mangukia was advised that she would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident.

Lee, Bu Sup Yun, and Jeong Hui Yun, Yun, Inc., T/a Park Lane Cut Rate Liquors, 4416-18 Park Heights Avenue – Class "A" Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – August 26, 2021** – On August 26, 2021, Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Agent Terri Chase, Agent Steven Han, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto, Greenhill and Lebrun and Police Cadet Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadet Jackson was under the age of 21; the cadet was given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 8:50pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadet Jackson ordered a single 24oz. can of Twisted Tea alcoholic hard iced tea from the server, later identified as Jeong Hui Yun, for a total of \$3.50, which the cadet purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadet Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Agent Chase and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Ms. Yun, who they then identified. Agent Chase and the task force informed Ms. Yun that she had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Ms. Yun was advised that she would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident. Ms. Yun was cooperative throughout.

Adnan Murad and Allison Marie Pachilis, Pimlico Bar & Liquor, LLC, T/a Pimlico Bar & Liquor, 5117 Park Heights Avenue – Class "BD7" Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – August 26, 2021** – On August 26, 2021, Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Agent Terri Chase, Agent Steven Han, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto, Greenhill

and Lebrun and Police Cadet Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadet Jackson was under the age of 21; the cadet was given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 9:00pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadet Jackson ordered a single 50ml “mini” bottle of Raspberry New Amsterdam Vodka from the server, later identified as Dezmon Troy Ervin, for a total of \$1.25, which the cadet purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadet Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Agent Chase and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Mr. Ervin, who they then identified. Agent Chase and the task force informed Mr. Ervin that he had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Mr. Ervin was advised that he would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident. Mr. Ervin was cooperative throughout.

8. **Soon Se Jhin, H&S, Inc., T/a Pepper’s Liquors, 5440 Reisterstown Road – Class “BD7” Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – August 26, 2021 –** On August 26, 2021, Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Agent Terri Chase, Agent Steven Han, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Leisher, Gatto, Greenhill and Lebrun and Police Cadet Jackson conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At the time of the incident, Cadet Jackson was under the age of 21; the cadet was given a departmental \$20 bill that was marked by photograph prior to any investigations commencing. At approximately 9:30pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Cadet Jackson ordered a single 350ml bottle of Red Berry New Amsterdam Vodka from the server, later identified as Jong Lee, for a total of \$7.60, which the cadet purchased with the departmental \$20 bill. After the purchase, Cadet Jackson exited the establishment carrying the alcoholic beverage. Moments later, Agent Chase and members of the joint agency taskforce entered the establishment and contacted the server, Mr. Lee, who they then identified. Agent Chase and the task force informed Mr. Lee that he had just sold alcohol to an underage police cadet. The alcoholic beverage and the change from the sale were returned to the establishment; the task force recovered the departmental \$20 bill. Mr. Lee was advised that he would not be charged criminally, but that a BLLC violation would be written up for the establishment. BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice left without further incident. Mr. Lee was cooperative throughout.
9. **Sherice M. Haywood and Parminder Singh, Gurjas, LLC, T/a Fayette Liquor Plus, 1434 E. Fayette Street – Class “A” Beer, Wine & Liquor License – Violation of Rule 4.01(a) Sales to Minors – July 7, 2021 –** On July 7, 2021 Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Walter Robinson, Agent Andy Perez, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Greenhill, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadet J. Thomas conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At approximately 10:30pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Prior to the incident, Cadet Thomas was given a marked departmental \$20 bill. Cadet Thomas, who was under the age of 21 at the time of the incident, purchased one 12oz. Heineken beer for \$2.00 from the server, later identified as Manjit Kaur. A departmental \$20 bill was used to make the purchase. Upon being furnished the alcoholic

beverage, Cadet Thomas immediately exited the establishment and notified BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice of the incident. The 12oz. Heineken beer was returned to the licensee along with the change from the transaction. BLLC Inspectors conducted a further investigation and identified a male individual working at the establishment whom in previous inspections was requested to produce identification and did not do so. During this investigation and inspection, BLLC Inspectors requested that employees produce employee records and the establishment did not provide them. A violation was issued for sales to a minor and for failure to produce employee records upon request.

Violation of Rule 3.03(c) Records – July 7, 2021 – On July 7, 2021 Board of Liquor License Commissioners (BLLC) Inspector Walter Robinson, Agent Andy Perez, Chief Inspector John Chrissomallis along with Baltimore Police Department Vice Unit (BPD Vice) Detectives Greenhill, Gatto and Lebrun and Police Cadet J. Thomas conducted random, joint investigations of establishments to determine if licensees would sell alcoholic beverages to minors. At approximately 10:30pm, the joint agency task force entered the establishment. Prior to the incident, Cadet Thomas was given a marked departmental \$20 bill. Cadet Thomas, who was under the age of 21 at the time of the incident, purchased one 12oz. Heineken beer for \$2.00 from the server, later identified as Manjit Kaur. A departmental \$20 bill was used to make the purchase. Upon being furnished the alcoholic beverage, Cadet Thomas immediately exited the establishment and notified BLLC Inspectors and BPD Vice of the incident. The 12oz. Heineken beer was returned to the licensee along with the change from the transaction. BLLC Inspectors conducted a further investigation and identified a male individual working at the establishment whom in previous inspections was requested to produce identification and did not do so. During this investigation and inspection, BLLC Inspectors requested that employees produce employee records and the establishment did not provide them. A violation was issued for sales to a minor and for failure to produce employee records upon request.
